Toshiki Okada Knocks it Out of the Park

Japanese and Korean performers explore the global influence of America's favorite past-time in this

American premiere tour stop at FringeArts

PHILADELPHIA – Toshiki Okada, one of Japan's most exciting theatrical voices, brings the American premiere of *God Bless Baseball* to FringeArts **January 21-23**. This playful take on the influence of America's favorite pastime on Japanese and Korean culture takes place at FringeArts' waterfront headquarters, 140 N Columbus Blvd. (at Race St.). Tickets cost between \$15 and \$29 and are available by phone at 215-413-1318 or online at FringeArts.com.

Two girls stand awkwardly on a baseball diamond with ill-fitting mitts and ask to learn the rules of the game. Two men explain the rules, but the girls frustrate their explanations to extreme degrees. Funny, awkward, painful, and both wide-ranging and very personal, *God Bless Baseball* reveals how deeply rooted the iconic American game is in everyday life in Japan and Korea, from the highest echelons of political power down into the most intimate family recollections.

Playwright and director Toshiki Okada is famous for taking on the peculiar idiosyncrasies and anxieties of contemporary life, and expanding them with unique choreography based on exaggerated everyday gestures. *God Bless Baseball* is performed by Japanese actors who play Korean roles (in Japanese) and Korean actors who play Japanese roles (in Korean).

Okada's works represent Japan's "lost generation," not unlike the United States' Millennial generation, who came of age during the Japanese recession of the 1990s. These young people were by and large forced to work as unskilled, part-time laborers, in jobs for which they were vastly overqualified. His works are distinguished by hyper-colloquial, deliberately inarticulate dialogue paired with highly stylized movement. His plays are choreographed, but are distinguished from dance by his focus on the "junk body" or "child's body", which rejects adult sexuality and Western dance techniques.

"I am always researching the relationship between speech and body," Okada says about his signature theatrical style. "I want to exaggerate this dance between speech and movement."

This is the second FringeArts presentation of Toshiki Okada, having previously curated *Hot Pepper, Air Conditioner, and The Farewell Speech* in the 2012 Fringe Festival. Okada also has a lengthy relationship with Dan Rothenberg, artistic director of Pig Iron Theater Company, with whom he collaborated on *Zero Cost House*, which was also in the Curated 2012 Fringe Festival.

Dan Rothenberg will be directing a reading of Okada's *Sonic Life of a Giant Tortoise* on Monday, January 18th. This reading is free and open to the public. He will also be moderating a talkback with Okada following the January 21st performance of *God Bless Baseball*.

ABOUT TOSHIKI OKADA:

Toshiki Okada is known around the world as one of the most groundbreaking playwrights and directors in Japanese theater today. His works are intrinsically Japanese, emerging from a contemporary setting with particular idiosyncrasies, anxieties and forms of expression. He formed the theater company chelfitsch in 1997 – naming it after a deliberate mispronunciation of the English word *selfish*. Its plays bring the intimacy of individual concerns into conversation with overshadowing issues, like the economic crisis or the cultural aftershocks of the Fukushima nuclear disaster. He is a winner of the Kishida Kunio Drama Award, Japan's most prestigious honor for playwrights.
